

Services and Investments Offer

General conditions

MERCOSUR members reserve the right to extend, modify, reduce or withdraw this offer at any time prior to the conclusion of the current MERCOSUR-EU negotiations, in order to ensure a final overall balance of rights and obligations among the Parties.

MERCOSUR members further reserve the right to make technical amendments to this offer and make corrections to rectify any errors, omissions, or inaccuracies in this offer as well as to clarify and interpret the terms and conditions of this offer.

The offer remains conditional on the final text of the Services and Establishment Chapters of the Mercosur-EU agreement, as well as on the other Chapters affecting trade in services and investment where definition is still pending.

This offer was elaborated taking into account the disciplines and principles of the General Agreement on Trade in Services (GATS) of the World Trade Organization, which recognize, among other elements, the flexibility to adopt specific commitments that are differentiated in terms of sectors and modes of supply.

This offer shall not be interpreted as limitations of domestic regulation or to the introduction of new regulation with a view to achieving national policy objectives, in accordance with the Fourth Paragraph of the Preamble to GATS and the main goals of this agreement.

The offer for the individual services sectors and sub-sectors is elaborated on the basis of a positive list approach and is identified in accordance with the classification list in Document MTN.GNS/W/120 of the World Trade Organization and corresponding CPC preliminary version numbers wherever.

The offer for the non-services sectors is elaborated on the basis of a positive list approach and based on the International Standard Industrial Classification (ISIC – Rev.3), for Argentina, Paraguay and Uruguay. For Brazil, the offer for the non-services sectors is based on the Central Product Classification (CPC – Rev. 2) and covers only non-services sectors and/or activities (headings 0, 1, 2, 3 and 4).

Where no reference is made to one or more MERCOSUR countries for a specific sector or subsector, it should be interpreted that that country or countries are not taking any commitments for that specific sector or sub-sector.

Measures that are inconsistent with both articles on market access and national treatment are inscribed in the column relating to market access. In this case the inscription shall be considered to provide a condition or qualification to national treatment as well.

### Specific conditions

Argentina:

Argentina reserves the right to use exchange rate regulations which are in conformity with the Articles of Agreement of the IMF.

Brazil: In case of doubt or divergences between the schedule of specific commitments of the non-services sectors and of the services sectors, the latter shall prevail.

For the purposes of interpretation of Brazilian commitments, the cross-border supply of services through electronic means, including the Internet, will be limited to mode 1.

Paraguay, Uruguay: This offer is based on the assumption that the MERCOSUR-EU agreement shall not interfere with existing bilateral agreements relating to taxes and tax measures or with the capacity of Mercosur countries to pursue the objectives of their fiscal policies.

- (iv) The present schedule does not include any commitment related to the activities which have their content transported by a telecommunication service. The content and treatment of those activities are regulated by their respective sectors.
- (v) Foreign satellites are permitted to have market access in Brazil, and regulatory decisions on this regard are based on a transparent, objective process and on a reciprocity basis. Telecommunication service providers must use Brazilian satellites, whenever they offer technical, operational or commercial conditions equivalent to foreign satellites.
- (vi) No limits shall be applied to the quantity of licenses that can be granted for the supply of telecommunications services, except in cases of technical impossibility, such as spectrum availability, or to avoid impairment to the supply of specific modalities of public interest services.
- (vii) Value Added Services are not defined as telecommunication services in the Brazilian legislation.

### ARGENTINA

#### NOTE TO THE ARGENTINE SCHEDULE

Where road, rail, inland waterways and auxiliary services are not otherwise fully covered in this schedule, a multimodal transport operator shall have the ability to rent or lease trucks, railway carriages or barges, and related equipment to local companies for the purpose of inland forwarding of cargoes, or have access to, and use of, these forms of multimodal activities on reasonable and non-discriminatory terms and conditions for the purpose of carrying out multimodal transport operations. (« Reasonable and non-discriminatory terms and conditions » means, for the purpose of multimodal transport operations, the ability of the multimodal transport operator to arrange for the conveyance of its merchandise on a timely basis, including priority over other merchandise which has entered the port at a later date.)

#### DEFINITIONS

1. Without prejudice to the scope of activities which may be considered as « cabotage » under the relevant national legislation, this schedule does not include « maritime cabotage services », which are assumed to cover transportation of passengers or goods, including goods bound for foreign destinations, between a port located in Argentina and another port located in Argentina and traffic originating and terminating in the same port located in Argentina provided that this traffic remains within Argentina's territorial waters.
2. « Other forms of commercial presence for the supply of international maritime transport services » means the ability for international maritime transport service suppliers of other Members to undertake locally all activities which are necessary for the supply to their customers of a partially or fully integrated transport service, within which the maritime transport constitutes a substantial element. (This commitment shall however not be construed as limiting in any manner the commitments undertaken under the cross-border mode of delivery).



These activities include, but are not limited to:

- (a) marketing and sales of maritime transport and related services through direct contact with customers, from quotation to invoicing, these services being those operated or offered by the service supplier itself or by service suppliers with which the service seller has established standing business arrangements;
- (b) the acquisition, on their own account or on behalf of their customers (and the resale to their customers) of any transport and related services, including inward transport services by any mode, particularly inland waterways, road and rail, necessary for the supply of the integrated services;
- (c) the preparation of documentation concerning transport documents, customs documents, or other documents related to the origin and character of the goods transported;
- (d) the provision of business information by any means, including computerised information systems and electronic data interchange (subject to the provisions of the annex on telecommunications);
- (e) the setting up of any business arrangements (including participation in the stock of a company) and the appointment of personnel recruited locally (or, in the case of foreign personnel, subject to the horizontal commitment on movement of personnel) with any locally established shipping agency;
- (f) acting on behalf of the companies, organising the call of the ship or taking over cargoes when required.

3. « Multimodal transport operators » means the person on whose behalf the bill of lading /multimodal transport document, or any other document evidencing a contract of multimodal carriage of goods, is issued and who is responsible for the carriage of goods pursuant to the contract of carriage.

4. « Maritime cargo handling services » means activities exercised by stevedore companies, including terminal operators, but not including the direct activities of dockers, when this workforce is organised independently of the stevedoring or terminal operator companies. The activities covered include the organisation and supervision of:

- the loading/discharging of cargo to/from a ship;
- the lashing/unlashing of cargo;
- the reception/delivery and safekeeping of cargoes before shipment or after discharge.

5. « Customs clearance services » (alternatively « customs house brokers' services ») means activities consisting in carrying out on behalf of another party customs formalities concerning import, export or through transport of cargoes, whether this service is the main activity of the service provider or a usual complement of its main activity.
6. « Container station and depot services » means activities consisting in storing containers, whether in port areas or inland, with a view to their stuffing/stripping, repairing and making them available for shipments.
7. « Maritime agency services » means activities consisting in representing, within a given geographic area, as an agent the business interests of one or more shipping lines or shipping companies, for the following purposes:
- marketing and sales of maritime transport and related services, from quotation to invoicing, and issuance of bills of lading on behalf of the companies, acquisition and resale of the necessary related services, preparation of documentation, and provision of business information;
  - acting on behalf of the companies organising the call of the ship or taking over cargoes when required.

- (e) the setting up of any business arrangements (including participation in the stock of a company) and the appointment of personnel recruited locally (or, in the case of foreign personnel, subject to the horizontal commitment on movement of personnel) with any locally established shipping agency;
- (f) acting on behalf of the companies, organizing the call of the ship or taking over cargoes when required.

2. "Maritime cargo handling services" means activities exercised by stevedore companies, including terminal operators, but not including the direct

activities of dockers, when this workforce is organized independently of the stevedoring or terminal operator companies. The activities covered include the organization and supervision of:

- the loading/discharging of cargo to/from a ship;
- the lashing/unlashing of cargo;
- the reception/delivery and safekeeping of cargoes before shipment or after discharge.

2. "Customs clearance services" (alternatively "customs house brokers' services") means activities consisting in carrying out on behalf of another party customs formalities concerning import, export or through transport of cargoes, whether this service is the main activity of the service provider or a usual complement of its main activity.

3. "Container station and depot services" means activities consisting in storing containers, whether in port areas or inland, with a view to their stuffing/stripping, repairing and making them available for shipments.

Maritime cabotage passenger or freight transport service includes all maritime passenger or freight transportation services rendered between a port or point located in the territory of Brazil and another port or point located in this same territory, including the so called feeder services, and movements of equipment as well;

2. The transportation of cargo as a result of public procurement, cargo financed or subsidized by the Brazilian government as well as oil and its by-products are reserved to vessels flying the Brazilian flag.

MARITIME TRANSPORT SERVICES  
NOTE TO THE URUGUAY SCHEDULE

Where road, rail, inland waterways and auxiliary services are not otherwise fully covered in this schedule, a multimodal transport operator shall have the ability to rent or lease trucks, railway carriages or barges, and related equipment, for the purpose of inland forwarding of cargoes, or have access to, and use of, these forms of multimodal activities on reasonable and non-discriminatory terms and conditions for the purpose of carrying out multimodal transport operations. (« Reasonable and non-discriminatory terms and conditions » means, for the purpose of multimodal transport operations, is the ability of the multimodal transport operator to arrange for the conveyance of its merchandise on a timely basis, including priority over other merchandise which has entered the port at a later date).

DEFINITIONS

1. Without prejudice to the scope of activities which may be considered as « cabotage » under the relevant national legislation, this schedule does not include « maritime cabotage services », which are assumed to cover transportation of passengers or goods between a port located in Uruguay and another port located in Uruguay and traffic originating and terminating in the same port located in Uruguay provided that this traffic remains within Uruguay's territorial waters.
2. « Multimodal transport operators » means the person on whose behalf the bill of lading /multimodal transport document, or any other document evidencing a contract of multimodal carriage of goods, is issued and who is responsible for the carriage of goods pursuant to the contract of carriage.
3. « Maritime cargo handling services » means activities exercised by stevedore companies, including terminal operators, but not including the direct activities of dockers, when this workforce is organised independently of the stevedoring or terminal operator companies. The activities covered include the organisation and supervision of:

- the loading/discharging of cargo to/from a ship;
  - the lashing/unlashing of cargo;
  - the reception/delivery and safekeeping of cargoes before shipment or after discharge.
4. « Container station and depot services » means activities consisting in storing containers, whether in port areas or inland, with a view to their stuffing/stripping, repairing and making them available for shipments.
5. « Maritime agency services » means activities consisting in representing, within a given geographic area, as an agent the business interests of one or more shipping lines or shipping companies, for the following purposes:
- marketing and sales of maritime transport and related services, from quotation to invoicing, and issuance of bills of lading on behalf of the companies, acquisition and resale of the necessary related services, preparation of documentation, and provision of business information;
  - acting on behalf of the companies organising the call of the ship or taking over cargoes when required.
6. « Freight forwarding services » means (the activity consisting of organising and monitoring shipment operations on behalf of shippers, through the acquisition of transport and related services, preparation of documentation and provision of business information

**ANNEX 3**

ADDITIONAL COMMITMENTS PARAGUAY  
FOR FINANCIAL SERVICES

EFFECTIVE AND TRANSPARENT REGULATION IN THE FINANCIAL SERVICES SECTOR

1. Each Party shall publish promptly and, except in emergency situations, at the latest by the time of their entry into force, all relevant measures of general application which pertain to or affect this Annex. Such measure shall be provided:
  - (a) by means of an official publication; or
  - (b) in other written or electronic form.
2. Each Party's appropriate financial authority shall make available to interested persons its requirements for completing applications relating to the supply of financial services.
3. On the request of an applicant, the appropriate financial authority shall inform the applicant of the status of its application. If such authority requires additional information from the applicant, it shall notify the applicant without undue delay.
4. Each Party shall make its best endeavours to ensure that internationally agreed standards for regulation and supervision in the financial services sector are implemented and applied in its territory. Such internationally agreed standards are, inter alia, the Basle Committee's "Core Principle of Effective Banking Supervision", the International Association of Insurance Supervisors' "Insurance Core Principles", the International Organisation of Securities Commissions' "Objectives and Principles of Securities Regulation and the "40 recommendations from the Financial Action Task Force on Money Laundering.

## MUTUAL RECOGNITION OF PRUDENTIAL MEASURES

1. Paragraph 2 and 3 apply with regard to mutual recognition of prudential measures in the area of financial services.
2. A Party may recognise prudential measures of the other Party in determining how the Party's measures relating to financial services shall be applied. Such recognition, which may be achieved through harmonisation or otherwise, may be based upon an agreement or arrangement or may be accorded autonomously.
3. A Party that is a party to an agreement or arrangement with a third party such as those referred to in paragraph 1, whether future or existing, shall afford adequate opportunity for the other Party to negotiate its accession to such agreements or arrangements, or to negotiate comparable ones with it, under circumstances in which there would be equivalent regulation, oversight, implementation of such regulation, and, if appropriate, procedures concerning the sharing of information between the Parties to the agreement or arrangement. Where a Party accords recognition autonomously, it shall afford adequate opportunity for the other Party to demonstrate that such circumstances exist.
